Special Theme Division Definitions

Nature Special Theme – Flowers –The flowers theme includes wildflower and domesticated, cultivated flowers such as roses, tulips, etc. The subject should be presented in its natural environment and should not be moved to a studio location. Images captured in greenhouses, botanical gardens, and the like are allowed, but no hand of man should be visibly present.

Open Special Theme – Sunrise/Sunset – The time of day one hour before and after the sun touches the horizon. Since this is an open category, the hand of man is allowed in the image. No sky replacement is allowed; the image must be the photographer's image.

This issue is posing problems for the US Copyright Office as well. Recently, someone tried to copyright an award-winning photo created totally with AI. The Copyright Office refused. Technology and the Photographer

The evolution of technology has had a profound impact on the field of photography, transforming it from a meticulous and resource-intensive process into an accessible and dynamic art form. Reflecting on the transition from film to digital, photographers can appreciate the significant strides made in terms of equipment, workflow, and creative possibilities.

In the days of film photography, particularly for fine art photographers, the process involved a 4 x 5 camera, limited film holders, and a restricted number of shots per trip. Each photograph required careful consideration, as the photographer carried the weight of both the equipment and the uncertainty of the outcome. The long trek to capture a single image, such as a waterfall shot, demanded physical endurance and artistic dedication, all without the immediate feedback we now take for granted.

The advent of 35mm film marked a notable improvement, offering more shots per roll and enabling photographers to carry multiple rolls, increasing the likelihood of capturing

the desired image. However, it was with the digital revolution that photography underwent a major change. Initially, digital sensors had their limitations, but rapid advancements quickly led to superior image quality, surpassing the capabilities of traditional film.

Today's digital cameras are sophisticated devices resembling mini-computers, equipped with advanced sensors, automatic exposure and features that simplify the photographic process. The era of unlimited shots on a small memory card has liberated photographers from the constraints of film, allowing for experimentation and creativity without the fear of running out of exposures.

Technological innovations have made it more accessible to a broader audience. Learning the craft has transitioned from formal education to on-line platforms, where aspiring photographers can gain knowledge through tutorials and videos. The availability of powerful image editing software, like Photoshop, has further simplified the post-processing aspect, offering a parallel to the darkroom techniques once mastered by iconic figures like Ansel Adams.

While some may lament the perceived loss of the traditional and tactile elements of film photography, embracing technology has undeniably expanded the horizons of the art. The ease of entry into photography has let

individuals to express their creativity and share their perspectives, creating a diverse and vibrant photographic community.

As we look ahead, the trajectory of technological progress in photography remains uncertain, promising innovations that could redefine the medium once again.

With that, I have a couple of points to make on this new technology that follows for Photography in general and with photo compositions. This is just meant as a start to a long and probably unending discussion on photography and what it means possibly to me and maybe to you.

AI and Photography

The integration of AI in photography has indeed transformed the professional landscape for photographers, providing them with powerful tools to enhance and expedite their workflow. My experience of over 40 year in photography highlights several key areas where AI has made a significant impact.

- 1. **Efficient Workflow:** AI has significantly accelerated the editing process, enabling photographers to achieve complex tasks in a fraction of the time it would traditionally take. Automation features, like sky replacement, not only streamline the editing process but also allow for creative flexibility, letting photographers experiment with different elements to achieve the desired visual impact.
- 2. **Image Restoration and Manipulation:** AI tools excel in tasks such as image restoration and manipulation. The ability to quickly and accurately remove or replace elements in an image, whether it be fixing imperfections, removing unwanted objects, or adding elements for creative purposes, has become an invaluable asset for photographers. This not only saves time but also allows for more experimentation and iteration in the creative process.
- 3. **Customization and Adaptability:** AI empowers photographers to make on-the-fly adjustments and customizations to suit specific requirements. The ability to seamlessly add or extend parts of an image, such as the sides, top, or bottom, contributes to a higher level of adaptability, catering to diverse client needs

without compromising the quality or intent of the original photograph.

- 4. **Time and Cost Savings:** Time is a crucial factor in the professional world, and AI contributes significantly to time savings. The efficiency gains translate directly into cost savings, enabling photographers to take on more projects and meet tight deadlines without sacrificing quality. This economic advantage enhances the overall competitiveness of photography professionals.
- 5. **Preserving Creative Intent:** Despite the speed and efficiency improvements brought about by AI, it's important to note that these tools are designed to assist and enhance rather than replace the photographer's creative vision. The application of AI doesn't necessarily alter the meaning or artistic value of an image; rather, it empowers photographers to manifest their creative ideas more effectively.
- 6. Opens Options to any Photographer: AI has moved photography from being a highly advanced technical person to the common photographer. You do not need to know how to fix something in the photo, now you tell the program to fix it and it does it for you. Opening photography to the masses instead of a highly technically trained photographer. Critics may raise concerns about the impact of AI on the authenticity and integrity of photographic artistry. However, I maintain that these technological advancements do not compromise the essence or meaning of an image. Instead, AI serves as a tool to augment and expedite the creative process, enabling photographers to focus on expression and storytelling without being hindered by technical limitations.

Should AI be in our Photo Competitions?

The integration of AI into photo competitions is a topic that elicits a wide range of opinions within the photography community. Here are some thoughts on the intersection of AI and photo competitions:

1. Advancements in Creativity

Positive Perspective: AI tools can be seen as innovative instruments that open new avenues

for creative expression. Photographers using AI might produce visually stunning and conceptually intriguing works that push the boundaries of traditional photography.

Concerns: Critics may worry that reliance on AI could shift the focus away from the human element of photography, emphasizing technical prowess over the ability to capture emotion, storytelling, and unique perspectives.

2. Inclusivity and Accessibility:

Positive Perspective: AI's ability to streamline workflows can make photography more accessible to a broader audience. It can empower photographers with limited resources or time, enabling them to participate in competitions and produce high-quality work.

Concerns: There may be concerns about creating a divide between photographers who use AI tools and those who don't. This could lead to questions about fairness and the impact on the diversity of styles represented in competitions.

Concerns: Judging AI-processed images might be challenging due to the subjective nature of art and the potential for biases. Establishing clear criteria for evaluating these images becomes crucial to maintaining

fairness.

5. Embracing Evolution:

Positive Perspective: Acknowledging and accepting AI in photo competitions reflects an understanding of the evolving landscape of technology and its impact on creative industries.

Concerns: There may be resistance from traditionalists who fear that the inclusion of AI could diminish the craft's historical and manual aspects.

In summary, the integration of AI in photo competitions brings both opportunities and challenges. Striking a balance between technological innovation, artistic expression, and the preservation of traditional values is essential for fostering a dynamic and inclusive photography community. Establishing transparent guidelines for the use of AI and ensuring fair judging processes can contribute to the successful incorporation of these advancements into the world of photo competitions.

Conclusion

Photography is a constant changing art form. I will always feel that photography is art, we the photographer create it using tools. We need to embrace both the old and the new. I imagine I kicking a hornets nest, but it is time for a discussion on this topic it is not going away.

fireworks display, Schumacher Farm County Park, and the Waunakee WaunaFest carnival midway. DPHC members can participate in the photo theme for that meeting. Recent photo themes have included Joy, Sorrow, Shadows, Best of the Summer, Green, Cars, and Flowers. Most of the original active club members were beginner or advanced beginner photographers, but after almost seven years of participating as a member of DHPC, their photography skills have increased dramatically. has a speaker or program at their meetings such as a local or regional professional photographer, a club member presenting photographs from a recent photography trip, or a club member presenting a program on a specific type of photography such as light painting, droplet photography, and burning steel wool photography. DHPC members have participated and received awards and honorable mentions in the WACCO Spring and Fall Competitions and the recently resumed Print Circuit. Drumlin Hills Photography Club has approximately 16 active members and is facilitated by Rona Neri, Pat Letterer, and Mark Weller, and the WACCO Delegates are Chuck Gustke and Robert Arntz.






